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METRA MEDIA RESPONSE

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I have received a number of press inquiries late this afternoon relative to a letter from the Speaker's legal counsel directed to three members of the General Assembly in connection with the Metra affair. Rather than attempt to address each of your questions separately, I thought it might be helpful if I were to issue this written response.

I am not allowed to comment on specific cases or investigations conducted by my office, as there are strict confidentiality provisions in the State Ethics Act. See 5 ILCS 430/25-90. However, I am able to discuss the procedures that we follow in all cases. When a complaint is made or I decide to look into a matter that comes to my attention, I first must seek approval from the Legislative Ethics Commission to Investigate. Assuming that I am granted such permission, at the conclusion of my investigation, I present my findings to the Commission and inform the members as to whether I found a violation of any ethics rules or laws. If I find there is a violation of the State Officials and Employees Ethics Act, I may also refer the matter to the Attorney General for the filing of a formal complaint. On the other hand, where I conclude that the evidence is insufficient, I inform the Commission of my decision to close the investigation and provide the basis for that decision. In coming to my decision I

may only consider whether existing laws and ethics rules have been violated. Although I can recommend new laws to address what I believe to be inappropriate conduct by legislators, enforcement actions are limited to violations of existing laws and rules. A decision to close an investigation based on insufficient evidence does not constitute a good housekeeping seal of approval or a best practices award. Moreover, closure does not bar the Inspector General from resuming the investigation if circumstances warrant. I hope this helps to address your questions.

In the next few days I will be submitting proposals to the General Assembly urging reform of the laws affecting patronage, conflicts of interests by legislators, the need for greater transparency and related matters.

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
